The Bible was not written to remain in the realm of ideas, but to touch real life. It does not speak only of great events, but of fear, guilt, hope, difficult decisions, failures, and new beginnings. That is why many people, even without religious training, have felt that the text “speaks to them”—not as a mystical voice, but as words that seem to understand what one is living through.

03 The Bible does not eliminate reason or demand blind faith.

It invites trust, yes, but also thinking, examination, and careful reading. Its authors do not hide their limitations or idealize their characters. On the contrary, they present human beings who are fragile, contradictory, and real. This gives the message a rare honesty, unlike texts designed to manipulate or impress.

Moreover, the Bible does not limit itself to informing about God; it proposes a relationship.

Reading it only to know more can leave it on the surface. Reading it with openness can turn it into a guide that shapes decisions, challenges attitudes, and offers comfort when life becomes disordered. It does not promise to remove problems, but it does offer direction and meaning in the midst of them.

This lesson does not invite placing the Bible on an untouchable pedestal or accepting it without questions.

It invites something simpler and more demanding at the same time: approaching it with honesty. Giving it space—not as just another book, but as a voice that has withstood the passage of time because it continues to answer the deepest questions of the human being.

Perhaps that is why no one could silence it. Because as long as there are people searching for meaning, forgiveness, and hope, this book will remain open... waiting to be read.
