EVERYONE IS SEARCHING FOR

**The search for God begins long before religion**

Although many people say they do not believe in God, very few can say they have never thought about Him. He appears when life hurts, when injustice angers us, when success feels empty, or when the unavoidable question arises:

**What is all this for? That restlessness is not born in the church; it is born in the human heart.**

**01** Today it is common to hear that God is merely an idea created by human beings, or an impersonal force that moves the universe without any interest in us.



Others imagine Him as so distant that, even if He existed, He would have nothing to do with daily life. The Bible does not present God in that way. It does not describe Him as a theory or a faceless energy, but as someone who makes Himself known, who gets involved, and who seeks relationship.

**That is why the Bible does not begin by trying to convince, but by showing.**

**03** Many people do not reject God, but rather the distorted image they have of Him.

A harsh, punishing, or contradictory God. The biblical vision presents something very different: a God who loves deeply, who is truly just and does not overlook evil, but who also does not abandon human beings when they fail. He is neither a cold judge nor an indulgent figure who allows everything. He is trustworthy, setting boundaries because He cares about who we are and who we can become.



It shows a God who acts, who creates, who speaks, and who draws near. A God who leaves traces in the world and also in human experience. He cannot be confined to formulas, but neither does He hide. He reveals Himself in a simple and constant way, so that anyone who wants to look can do so.

**This way of being is made especially clear in Jesus.**

In Him, God stops being a distant idea and becomes close. He does not speak from above, but from within life itself. He approaches the wounded, the confused, the doubter, and the one who has failed. He does not force belief, but invites people to look, to listen, and to decide.

**To seek God, then, is not to stop thinking or to deny science.**

It is to dare to consider that life may not be only the product of chance, and that our need for meaning is not an accident. It is to recognize that perhaps we are not alone, and that behind what is visible there is Someone who wants to be known.

This lesson does not seek to impose a belief, but to open a possibility: that the God the Bible speaks of is not a religious concept, but a real, close, and transforming presence. If that God exists and has made Himself known, then the most important question is not whether we believe in Him... but whether we are willing to know Him.
